#### Commissioned Ruling Elder (CRE) Defined

A CRE is a ruling elder in the Presbyterian Church (USA) who is granted a local commission by the Presbytery to particular pastoral service as assigned by the presbytery.

## **Term of Commissioning**

Upon satisfactorily completing the required training, the Presbytery commissions the ruling elder for a period of up to three years. The commission shall be reviewed annually and may be renewed at expiration or terminated at any time at the discretion of the Presbytery. Once the specific commission lapses, the CRE may be authorized to serve again and, if so, must be commissioned again by the Presbytery (G-2.1002).

## **Service of the Commissioned Ruling Elder**

The commission depends on the particular service the Presbytery has identified. There are two forms of service: (1) Serving as a commissioned Lay Pastor (CLP) who performs all of the pastoral functions in a congregation or set of congregations; and (2) as a Ruling Elder commissioned to a specific service (CRE) in a congregation or set of congregations, such as administering sacraments, officiating weddings, or moderating a Session. A commissioned ruling elder may moderate the Session of the congregation only if commissioned as a Lay Pastor, or if not also officiating sacraments in the same congregation. Permission for specific activities will be included in the contract established between Sessions and the CLP/CRE, with the approval of the Committee on Ministry.

#### **Ministry Placement**

The Session of any church in the Presbytery of Baltimore may request that the
Presbytery, , provide for its pastoral needs through the commissioning of a ruling elder.
The Session may enter into a contractual relationship with a ruling elder whose
preparation for lay pastoral ministry is certified by the CPM in this Presbytery, with the
approval of the Committee on Ministry.

#### The Theological and Constitutional Basis for CREs

In baptism, each of us is claimed by God and called to a life of faith and service in Christ's name. Ordination to one of the three ordered ministries (Deacons, Ruling Elders, and Ministers of Word and Sacrament) is an act of the church and gift of the Spirit to the church "to order its life so that the ministry of the whole people of God may flourish (G-2.0102). Ruling elders, together with ministers of the Word and Sacrament, exercise leadership, government, spiritual discernment, and discipline and have responsibilities for the life of a congregation as well as the whole church (G-2.0301).

When the Presbytery determines, in consultation with a Session, that a church's pastoral needs might best be filled by an ordained lay leader, it may commission a ruling elder for specific service in the church (G-2.1001). Commissioned ruling elders are commissioned to provide spiritual leadership for specific congregations or specific ministries in the world. Such "commissioning" is for a limited time.

 Commissioned ruling elders institutionally speaking are a hybrid creation of the Church to respond to special historical and cultural needs of particular faith communities. As baptized Christians, they are ordained (priesthood of all believers) to minister in Jesus' name. As elders they are ordained to church office. Yet, they are neither called nor ordained as teaching elders for the whole Church. They are commissioned ruling elders (non-clergy).

In recognizing and empowering for service commissioned ruling elders, the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the Presbytery of Baltimore respond faithfully to God's call to the needs of the Church in this present and emerging age. "Behold, I am doing a new thing!" (Isaiah 43:18-19).

## **Desired Qualities in Applicants**

#### **Personal Qualities**

The Presbytery looks for experienced elders who have soundness of mind and spirit and who possess the judgment and inner freedom to lead, hear and be present to people in need.

## **Spiritual Qualities**

The Presbytery of Baltimore looks for elders who give evidence of the possession of gifts and graces fit for service to congregations and ministries, including but not limited to:

- Lively faith in the triune God
- The ability to articulate one's faith clearly
- Personal maturity, as evidenced by emotional stability, flexibility, integrity in handling personal and family financial matters, and the willingness to accept appropriate responsibility for errors in judgment
- An inquiring mind that is open to learning
- Willingness to further the peace, unity, and purity of the Presbyterian Church (USA)

### **Educational Requirements for Applicants**

Ordinarily, applicants must hold a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university. The CPM may make an exception if the candidate demonstrates the necessary gifts and talents for this ministry.

#### Concurrent Preparation for Ministry of Word and Sacrament

Commissioned ruling elders who are actively serving may apply to enroll in the preparation for ministry of word and sacrament. The CPM will determine what steps are necessary and notify the COM prior to enrolling the CRE.

Individuals may not apply for preparation as a CRE while engaged in preparation for ministry of word and sacrament. The CPM shall not enroll individuals in both courses of

preparation concurrently, and no inquirer or candidate for ministry of word and sacrament shall be certified ready for examination as a CRE.

#### **Preparation for Commissioned Service**

#### **The Discernment Process**

Initial discernment occurs collaboratively between an individual, their home church, the the CPM and the COM.

## Discerning the Call:

The initial steps for preparation to become a commissioned ruling elder may be taken by either the congregation or the individual. If a congregation feels its pastoral needs may best be met by a CRE in limited service or a CLP, it should be in touch with the COM to determine if the Presbytery's strategy for mission would be served by supporting this model of pastoral leadership in that congregation.

Alternatively, a particular individual who is already ordained as a Ruling Elder may sense a call to a ministry role as a CRE or CLP. If an individual feels drawn to serve in either role, whether in conversation with their home congregation or not, they should first contact the CPM. If the call is to a limited role as a CRE (perhaps in one's home church), the CPM will contact the COM about possibilities for service before enrolling the individual for additional discernment and training for that particular role. If the Individual is discerning a call to serve a congregation as a CLP they may be enrolled by the CPM for preparation and certification before exploring possible placements for commissioning.

 Home Church Endorsement: In both cases described above, the individual should approach the Pastor of their home church (if applicable) and discuss the sense of call to serve as a CRE. In the absence of pastoral leadership, the individual should contact the Session's moderator. The individual shall have been a member of the local church for at least one year and shall already be an ordained ruling elder. The Session shall interview the applicant and provide for an agreed period for discernment. Upon enrollment by the CPM and endorsement by the Session, the Session shall appoint an one of its members to serve as a liaison to the applicant.

#### **The Preparation Process**

Following the initial discernment, the preparation process is under the oversight of the CPM.

<u>Application</u>: An application is available on the website of the Baltimore Presbytery. This form should be completed by the applicant and his or her Session. If the applicant is pursuing commissioning as a lay pastor, the application should be emailed to the Chair of the CPM along with three letters of recommendation (see application form for information on references). If the applicant is seeking commissioning for a limited service either in their home church or another

136 congregation, the application shall be sent to the COM which will refer it to the CPM for supervised training appropriate to the service.

<u>Background Check</u>: Upon receipt of an application, the Presbytery will conduct a criminal and driving background check. Any concerns by the ruling elder regarding this routine check should be brought to the attention of the moderator of the Session early in the process of preparation.

<u>Initial Interview</u>: When the application and background check are complete, an interview will be scheduled with the CPM. Based on the results of that interview, the successful applicant will be enrolled in the preparation track that they have selected.

<u>Liaisons:</u> One or more liaisons from CPM will be assigned and keep CPM informed of the progress of the applicant.

<u>Program of Study</u>: A program of study will be approved by CPM, who will take into consideration evidence of previous study relevant to preparation for ministry, relevant life experiences and the specific track the candidate is pursuing.

<u>Course Work</u>: Candidates for commissioned for lay pastoral service will be required to complete training in: Reformed theology; worship and sacraments; Presbyterian polity; pastoral care; Old Testament exegesis; New Testament exegesis; and homiletics. The CPM will maintain a list of approved courses and institutions and prior approval should be sought before enrolling in a particular course. [Additional explanation on courses and competencies are detailed in the appendix]

Those preparing for a commission to limited service in a congregation will be advised as to what courses will be required for the particular service. The applicant will be advised to complete the coursework from the same approved institutions recommended for those preparing for lay pastor commissioning.

<u>Vocational Assessment (CLP candidates only)</u>: During the first year, the individual is required to schedule and complete a two-day vocational assessment at an accredited center approved by CPM. CPM considers the results of this testing to be important in determining the fitness of the individual for lay pastoral ministry. The fee for testing will be paid in equal one third shares by the applicant, the applicant's congregation, and the Presbytery (through the Committee on Preparation for Ministry).

<u>Field Internship (CLP candidates only)</u>: Working with a member of CPM, the individual will be assigned to a program of field study under the guidance of a teaching elder of the Presbytery of Baltimore in a congregation other than the candidate's home church. This field internship is to prepare the individual for the role and responsibilities of a CLP. A written field evaluation report will be submitted to CPM by the internship supervisor.

 181 <u>"Dismantling Racism"</u> and <u>"Healthy Boundaries"</u> trainings (or another form of sexual misconduct prevention training) are required as part of CLP/CRE training and must be completed prior to the individual's final evaluation.

<u>Final Evaluation</u>: Following completion of the program of preparation, the individual will meet with the CPM and will be assessed for readiness to serve.

Examination and Commissioning: Once the type of placement has been identified and approved by the COM and a congregation has extended an offer, the CPM will present the candidate to the Presbytery for examination, "as to personal faith and motives for seeking the commissioned ruling elder or lay pastor position, and the areas of instruction mentioned previously." (G-2-1002) Upon satisfactory examination, the COM will recommend the Presbytery approve commissioning to the particular service.

## **Expenses and Cost Sharing**

The candidate will bear the costs including:

- Seminary/online courses
- Coursework books, supplies
- Expenses required by field education

## The following costs are shared:

- The Presbytery will cover the cost of required background checks.

- The vocational assessment is shared between the presbytery, individual, and home church. The Presbytery will cover one third of the total cost.

#### **Evaluation and Certification**

Official records shall be provided for all required instruction. The individual shall:

- 1. Send transcripts showing the satisfactory completion of the course work required by the commission.
- 2. For those on the CLP track, write an exegetical paper (8 to 10 pages, double spaced).
- 3. For those on the CLP track, submit a sermon manuscript or audio/video recording of a recent sermon.
- 4. Meet with members of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry for an extended oral evaluation to assess the individual's overall preparation for the particular track, including their required coursework. If the group leading this oral exam determines that the candidate is ready and answers satisfactorily, they will recommend a final meeting with the whole committee.

The individual's CPM liaison(s) will provide a written report detailing the individual's suitability, strengths, and limitations as a CRE/CLP.

Upon determination that the individual has completed the requirements of the Presbytery, after successful examination by the CPM it will certify the candidate ready to be

226 commissioned if the Presbytery approves. The Presbytery is the commissioning body, 227 and commissioning is not an automatic outcome of certification. 228 229 **Assigned Mentors for CLPs** 230 Upon commissioning as a CLP, a teaching elder of Baltimore Presbytery will be assigned 231 by the COM as a mentor. The mentor will make regular contact with the CLP to support 232 the individual in their sense of call and personal/professional wellbeing.
